Program: Renovation of an existing three-story industrial building with private residence on the third and added fourth and fifth floors, that includes living room, family room, dining room, kitchen, study, powder room, mudroom, gallery, 3 bedrooms with baths, playroom, tree house, central garden courtyard, bedroom terraces





Site

The original project site is an existing three-story brick light-industrial building, approximately 100 years old. The footprint of the site (and building perimeter) is 50 x 100 feet. The front façade is oriented to the north; to the east is an eight-story commercial building; and to the west is a single-story renovated art gallery. The neighborhood is west Chelsea, the heart of New York's emerging gallery district, which is nestled between the Flatiron District, the West Village, and lower midtown Manhattan. Chelsea's existing warehouses and garages are increasingly being rescued and turned into commercial and residential spaces. The design of this residence reinforces the industrial scale of the neighborhood, yet attempts to establish an essentially human and personalized residential space. The client's emphasis on outdoor spaces and natural lighting provided a unique framework for creating a natural carved precinct within the dense urban fabric.


The program consisted of the conversion of an existing three-story warehouse to include a ground-floor commercial space, a second floor rental apartment, and a single family residence on the third, fourth, and fifth

The shell of the existing building remained intact: it is a foil, masking the metamorphosis behind the façade. From the street, the residence is barely perceptible. A metal-clad volume emerging from behind the brick shell along with a steel trellis and rooftop trees provides hints of the space within. Upon entering the garden after ascending a long flight of stairs, the veil is lifted. A generous lawn, 30 x 40 feet, provides the canvas for the central garden. Planters with ground cover and bamboo mediate between the lawn and the garden façade of the house. Breaking from the geometry of the existing box, a figural, desultory line inscribed in the plan demarcates and obscures the boundary between inside and outside. The garden occupies the void, while the rooms of the house envelope the garden, creating a visual transparency revealing a diverse and richly textured inner landscape.


The public spaces of the house are arranged around the main garden on the lower level. The private rooms are situated above. Interior rooms are arranged enfilade with each interior space relating to the interior progression and to the landscape of the courtyard and the sky. Views onto and through the garden from various vantage points create a series of layered spaces that fuse the interior and exterior, urban and natural, sculptural and organic.


Within the shell of the existing warehouse, a new structural frame was inserted. This simple system allows for interventions based on an open plan. The residence employs an independent structural system of steel with wood framing to achieve the sculptural forms of the architecture. The design of the residence combines a palette of grass, pea gravel, plantings, and flowers with metal, wood, stone, and stucco finishes. Materials are continuous from the exterior to the interior, reinforcing the close relationship between the two.





Upper floor plan









- 1. FOYER 2. STUDY

- 12. PLAYROOM 13. UPPER GALLERY


- 14. MASTER BEDROOM 15. GARDEN TERRACE






Perspective view of roof
