







OUTDOOR CLASSROOM AND VINE TRELLISES

The Arnold Arboretum remains one of the best-preserved landscapes of America's premier landscape architect Frederick Law Olmsted. The Pavilion, within the new vine and shrub collection, serves as an outdoor classroom and a place of repose. Visitors moving toward the pavilion experience a spatial sequence of continual discovery and disclosure, alternating between the intimacy created by the planted vine structures and the expansiveness of the central lawn. Vine panels occlude views to the planted terraces, and gradually reveal the shelter. Once at the pavilion, attention is directed out over the prospect of the gardens, revealing the expanse of the site.
