

BELOW: The Oaks, a property within an ancient oak grove on Martha's Vineyard, wraps an existing hilltop knoll rather than sitting atop it. This view of the house from the deck captures the roof layers, which create clerestories between them to bring in the light from above. We implemented untreated cedar shiplap siding, so it will weather to gray and match the natural textures of the woods.

FACING PAGE: The rich and layered nature of the structure unfolds in the dining area and kitchen, where the stone floor and the overhang extends from outside to inside to blur the boundary between the two. 


BELOW: The Eagle Meadow House is located among the pastures and old stonewalls of New Hampshire and opens up to the landscape and sun through broad expanses of glass and sliding doors towards the river. An undulating footprint defines a series of outdoor rooms which frame unique views from or through the house to the meadow, river, horizon, and sky.

FACING PAGE TOP: The sliding doors in the kitchen seamlessly open the space to the surrounding landscape.

TOP: The one-story Egret Meadow home on Martha's Vineyard is conceived of carefully placed horizontal planes met by delicate glass walls and doors. The large overhang on the south side shields the expanses of glass from the sun and creates an "extension room" on the deck that overlooks the inlet and meadow beyond.

BELOW: The entry is a "dogtrot;" a southern vernacular that lets the breeze blow through and creates a wonderful transition to the site.

FACING PAGE TOP: In the living room, dining room, and kitchen, we invited the tranquility of the surrounding land to become a part of the space through sliding doors, thus heightening the sense of trust between nature and home while creating ambiguity between the interior and exterior.

FACING PAGE BOTTOM: The interior spaces of the home, including the kitchen, are built around the multiple planes of light entering the rooms at different points during the day.
